
2012 census

all about Kiwiburn's paddock dwellers

Grab a cup of tea and let's get to know each other a little better...

Remember that lovely census form you received at Kiwiburn? Well, 80 of you completed it (nice round number) and we now have a better idea of what sort of people make up Kiwiburn.

If you are 32, Kiwi-born, employed and living in Auckland... with a strong sense of community and self-expression and a big love for art, fire, music and costumes... well, it seems Kiwiburn is the place for you J

Not that we are out to stereotype people or put them in little boxes but it does help the ExCom understand the makeup of the festival and what sort of things bring people to the Paddock!

Here are some quick practical facts you may find interesting....

Age: The average age of a Kiwiburner is 32. With the ladies generally being slightly younger than the

men (average age female is 30, while the average age male is 34). Our youngest person was 18 and the oldest 62. (This is not counting the little kids, those of us who lie about our age or those

who just don't tell)

Gender: 56% of the attendants were female and 44% male (or maybe girls are just better at paperwork and

surveys and things like that)

Nationality: We had 12 nations represented on the Paddock. 61% Kiwi, 14% American, 6% British, 5%

Australian, 4% Canadian, 2.5% German and then a scattering of Dutch, French, Irish, Scottish,

South African and Zambian

Current city: A massive 86% of burners are currently living in NZ with the other 14% here as visitors. (Now I am

wondering how many of the visitors came over especially for Kiwiburn or if they just happened to be

in NZ anyway).

Of those that live in NZ about 13% didn't tell us which city they lived in. Of those that did respond,

we can tell you that 56% hail from Auckland, 24% from Wellington and 6% from Christchurch. We

also had representatives from Whangerei, Hamilton, Dargaville, Raglan & Thames.

Transport: Considering how many people travelled from Auckland and Wellington, it's not surprising to hear

that 84% of people travelled by car. Only 12.5% had to use multiple forms of transport.

Professionally: 46% of our burners are employed, 41% are freelance/self-employed, 9% are students and 4% are

retired

Sexually: 73% of us are straight, 22% bisexual and 5% of us are gay

Relationship: 55% are in relationships, 41% are single and 4% are unsure

Now for a little look at some of the personality traits among burners

Artistic Nature: Interestingly 36% of our community consider themselves to be artists while 21% say they are not.

The remaining 43% are 50/50

Personality: 18% of people on the paddock consider themselves to be extroverts and 20% consider themselves

to be introverts. 62% are 50/50.

While on the paddock, 49% of people feel brave, 4% shy and 47% 50/50.

Burn history

Kiwiburn: 39% of people were attending Kiwiburn for the first time

23% had been to 1 previous burn,

10% to 2 previous burns 10% to 3 previous burns 5% to 4 previous burns 9% to 5 previous burns

5% to 6 or more previous burns

Burning Man: 30% of people have been to Burning Man in Nevada (15% of the NZ born burners had been to BM,

and the rest were our international friends)

12% of these people said they prefer Kiwiburn to Burning Man and 17% said they prefer Burning

Man. 71% said they couldn't choose which they preferred!

What brings you here

Vector 83% of people heard about Kiwiburn from friends who had been before (that just goes to show how

much people love this festival and want to share it with their friends)

8% of people heard about Kiwiburn through Burning Man (either BM web site on the playa)

1% each go to Internet, posters and a random meeting. 5% say "other"...hmmm, wonder what that

could be?

What attracts you to Kiwiburn?

So many people cited multiple reasons for being there; Community, self-expression, art and fire seem to be great attractors...with music and costumes not far behind. Here is a list of what people say attracts then to Kiwiburn.

79% Ticked the box called Community

66% Cited Self-expression as a reason for being there

65% said they were attracted by the Art

64% came for the Fire

50% were escaping

48% came for the love of Music

48% same for the wonderful Costumes (and boy were we glad)

38% were on a Spiritual Quest

39% were there for the Novelty

28% attended with/for Family

25% were attracted by Romance and sex (and 54% of people had sex so this obviously works)

23% were attracted by Nudity (to be it or see it?)

21% ticked the box for Self Destruction

13% had obligations that bought them here and

7% of people say they were dragged to Kiwiburn (dragged there smiling I hope)

Spend: 51% of people spent less than \$400 on their Kiwiburn experience

22% spent \$401-\$700 10% spent \$701-\$1000 8% spent \$1001-\$1500 and 9% spent more than \$1500

Life on the Paddock

Who did you come with:

88% of burners came with a wonderful mix of friends, a lover or family. 12% came alone... but we are sure they did not stay that way for long J

Theme camps: 51% of people were part of a theme camp, 26% were not and well, the other 23% are not sure

either way J

Sex: 54% of people had sex at Kiwiburn – that's 2% less than last year!

Life after Kiwiburn

Do you feel the location of Kiwiburn should change?

31% think Kiwiburn should move, 43% don't mind and 26% say don't go anywhere

5 days or 3?

82% of us want Kiwiburn to remain a 5 day festival. 5% feel it would be better condensed into three days. 10% think more is better and think it would be a week or more and 3% really don't mind either way.

Kiwiburn as a dating site:

15% of people who have been to Kiwiburn in previous years have had a relationship with someone they met at Kiwiburn. Hardly surprising considering how many wonderful people you meet on the paddock!

Getting involved:

53% of people feel that they would like to be involved in the organisational side of Kiwiburn in the future. Swing anyone?

Well, this question was added just for silliness and although a lot of people chose to ignore the questions, we actually did get some answers. (these stats are based on answers received rather than overall survey numbers J)

76% of people have never been (leaving 24% who have). 49% say they would consider it!

Ah the most important question of the survey –When times are tough do you think of Karl for comfort and joy?

67% gave a resounding YES 25% do not think of Karl (well, they aren't admitting it if they do) And 8% want to know "Who the *&^% is Karl?"
